MINUTES OF THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL AND SPECIAL SERVICE DISTRICT COUNCILS OF

INDIANAPOLIS, MARION COUNTY, INDIANA MONDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 2022

The City-County Council of Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana and the Indianapolis Police Special Service District Council, Indianapolis Fire Special Service District Council and Indianapolis Solid Waste Collection Special Service District Council convened in regular concurrent sessions, in the Council Chamber of the City-County Building at 7:07 p.m. on Monday, February 7, 2022 with Councillor Osili presiding.

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

The President proposed the adoption of the agenda as distributed. Without objection, the agenda was adopted.

APPROVAL OF THE JOURNAL

The President called for additions or corrections to the Journals of January 10, 2021. There being no additions or corrections, the minutes were approved as distributed.

PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, MEMORIALS, SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS, AND COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS

PROPOSAL NO. 25, 2022. The proposal, sponsored by Councillor Adamson, recognizes Reese Hamilton for his commitment to creating opportunities to promote peace in his community. Councillor Adamson read the proposal and presented Reese and his family with a copy of the

document and Council pins. Reese thanked the Council for the recognition. Councillor Adamson moved, seconded by Councillor Jones, for adoption. Proposal No. 25, 2022 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 25, 2022 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 5, 2022, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 5, 2022

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION recognizing Reese Hamilton.

WHEREAS, Reese Hamilton was born on June 28, 2008, in Indianapolis. He is a student at Center for Inquiry School 70, where he shows excellent leadership among his fellow students; and

WHEREAS, after seeing police officers in his neighborhood due to a crime committed, Reese realized that violence was getting closer to home. He was afraid of the violence that was occurring in the city, but at just eight years old, Reese knew that he could do something to change it; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, Reese wrote a letter to Mayor Hogsett explaining his concerns, and together, they worked on a plan to help children feel safe; and

WHEREAS, in October 2016, Reese led his first Peace March through his neighborhood, where various community leaders including Mayor Hogsett, joined him; and

WHEREAS, Reese's annual efforts include the Bike Ride for Peace, two giveaways at Military Park for those in need, the Thanksgiving giveaway, and his most recent act of kindness has been collecting stocking stuffers for homeless people and neighborhoods in need; and

WHEREAS, Reese has received support from his community to continue his work in the city and, most importantly, support from his family, including his mother and his big brother; and

WHEREAS, Reese Hamilton's involvement and dedication have been recognized by numerous news networks and awards. Today he is celebrated for his work in the community; now therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The City-County Council recognizes Reese Hamilton for his willingness to serve the city and wishes him success in his future endeavors.

SECTION 2. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

PROPOSAL NO. 75, 2022. The proposal, sponsored by Councillor Osili, recognizes Black History Month. Several Councillors read the proposal, and presented a copy of the document and Council pin to Sampson Levingston, Through 2 Eyes, a researcher and author of Indianapolis black history who gives tours of African American neighborhoods in the City. Mr. Levingston thanked the Council for recognizing the rich history of the African American community in Indianapolis. Councillor Potts moved, seconded by Councillor Jackson, for adoption. Proposal No. 75, 2022 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 75, 2022 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 6, 2022, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 6, 2022

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION recognizing Black History Month.

WHEREAS, Africans were first brought involuntarily to the shores of the United States as early as the 17th century; and

WHEREAS, by 1827, 6 years after the founding of Indianapolis, 55 of the City's 1,066 residents were Black, intertwining Black history and Indianapolis history since the City's earliest days; and

WHEREAS, as a people, Black Americans have survived enslavement, lynch mobs, segregation, legalized discrimination, and denial of the basic and fundamental rights of citizenship, and nonetheless secured their freedom and have risen to serve Indianapolis, the State of Indiana, and the United States at the highest levels of government, business, academia, philanthropy, and the military; and

WHEREAS, the contributions of Black Americans from all walks of life throughout the history of this City have made unforgettable marks on Indianapolis and the world as artists, scientists, educators, entertainers, entrepreneurs, athletes, thought leaders, faith leaders, and political and governmental leaders; and whereas Black residents of Indianapolis have been essential to the City's growth, vibrancy, and success on the world stage; and

WHEREAS, those leaders have included the likes of Madam C.J. Walker, Marshall "Major" Taylor, Freeman Ransom, Noble Sissle, Wes Montgomery, Father Boniface Hardin, Sister Edna Mae Barnes Martin, Mari Evans, Oscar Robertson, George McGinnis, Angela Brown, Kenneth "Babyface" Edmonds, Cleo Blackburn, Amos Brown, Julia Carson, and too many more to name; and

WHEREAS, Indianapolis has been the backdrop for important developments in Black history, including being home to one of the most active "stops" on the Underground Railroad at the historic Bethel AME Church; the 1895 founding of the Indianapolis Recorder, the fourth-oldest surviving Black newspaper in the United States; the rise of Indiana Avenue as a national destination for jazz musicians and singers; hosting, and winning, the first game of the inaugural season of the Negro National Baseball League, played on May 2, 1920 at Washington Park in Indianapolis; and

WHEREAS, in spite of these notable individuals, accomplishments, and places, many Black Americans in Indianapolis and elsewhere have lived, toiled, and died in obscurity, never achieving the recognition they deserved but still paving the way for future generations to succeed; and

WHEREAS, in the face of injustices, people of good will and of all races in the Indianapolis and the United States have distinguished themselves with a commitment to the noble ideals on which the United States was founded and have fought courageously for the rights and freedom of Black Americans and others; now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. This Council acknowledges that all people of Indianapolis and of the United States are the recipients of the wealth of history provided by Black culture.

SECTION 2. The Council likewise recognizes the significance of Black History Month as an important opportunity to commemorate the tremendous contributions of Black Americans to the history of our City, State, and nation.

SECTION 3. The Council encourages the celebration of Black History Month to provide a continuing opportunity for all people in our community to learn from the past and understand the experiences of the Black Americans who have shaped Indianapolis.

SECTION 3. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 4. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

PROPOSAL NO. 78, 2022. The proposal, sponsored by Councillors Jones, Brown, Carlino, Jackson, McCormick and Lewis, honors and raises awareness for youth affected by teen dating violence. Several Councillors read the proposal, and Councillor McCormick moved, seconded by Councillor Jones, for adoption. Proposal No. 78, 2022 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 78, 2022 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 7, 2022, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 7, 2022

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION recognizing Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month.

WHEREAS, dating violence is defined as a pattern of assaultive and controlling behaviors used by one person against another in order to gain or maintain power and control in a relationship; and

WHEREAS, dating violence is very common, especially among teens and young adults: one in three teens in the US will experience physical, sexual, or emotional abuse from someone they are in a relationship with; and

WHEREAS, Indiana faces higher than average rates of teen dating violence. One in ten Hoosier teens face physical violence in their relationship and one in eight have experienced sexual violence in their relationship; and

WHEREAS, teen dating violence can display itself in multiple forms. Teens facing violence in their relationships may be subject to physical, sexual, or psychological violence, including stalking; and

WHEREAS, violence and aggressive behaviors in adolescent intimate relationships can create unhealthy relationship patterns which often continue throughout life. Supporting the development of healthy, respectful, and nonviolent relationships can help reduce the occurrence of teen dating violence and prevent its harmful effects; and

WHEREAS, during the pre-teen and teen years, it is important for youth to begin learning the skills needed to create and maintain healthy relationships; and

WHEREAS, teen dating violence impacts youth and families of all backgrounds across Indianapolis; and

WHEREAS, placing value and importance on local organizations that work to educate and assist youth about the signs and effects of unsafe relationships is crucial to ensuring the safety of our teens; and

WHEREAS, the Marion County Prosecutor's Office recognizes this social problem and has secured a multi-year public grant to provide a dedicated deputy prosecutor to educate youth on the issue and prosecute related cases; and

WHEREAS, February is National Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month, and because the residents of Indianapolis of all ages are deserving of healthy family and partner relationships; now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The City-County Council recognizes the vital role it plays in supporting the wellbeing of our City's youth population with appropriate activities and programs aimed at preventing and recognizing all forms of dating abuse.

SECTION 2. The Council similarly recognizes the toll that dating violence takes on youth and families in Indianapolis, and embraces its civil duty to help Indianapolis teens gain the skills and knowledge needed to form healthy and safe relationships.

SECTION 3. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 4. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

WHEREAS, at the November 8, 2016 general election, the voters of Marion County approved this localpublic question by a vote of 191,989 in favor (59.36%) to 131,426 against (40.64%); and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to IC 6-3.6-7-27 and IC 8-25-3-1, the Council adopted Fiscal Ordinance No. 001-2017 to impose an additional local income tax rate for the public transportation project; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to IC 6-3.6-3-3(b), the new tax rate took effect on October 1, 2017; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to IC 8-25-3-7 and IC 6-3.6-7-27, the local income tax revenues attributable to thenew additional tax rate "may be used only to purchase, establish, operate, repair, or maintain a public transportation project authorized under [IC 8-25]"; and,

WHEREAS, IC 8-25-4-2 provides that the City-County Council "may adopt an ordinance authorizing apublic transportation corporation to carry out a public transportation project in accordance with the powers granted to the public transportation corporation under IC 36-9-4," subject to the Council's appropriating power and any other powers reserved for the Council; and,

WHEREAS, the Indianapolis Public Transportation Board of Directors adopted the Marion County Transit Plan by approval of action item A-8 at the Board's meeting held on March 24, 2016; and,

WHEREAS, in 2017, pursuant to G.O. 52, 2017, the City-County Council authorized the Indianapolis Public Transportation Corporation ("IPTC") to carry out a public transportation project in accordance with IC8-25 and IC 36-9-4; and,

WHEREAS, the Super Stops design plans include permanent stations to be constructed in the public right-of-way along the bus stops set forth in Sec. 621-402(c) of the Revised Code; and,

WHEREAS, the Super Stops design plans include bus-and-turn (BAT) lanes on segments of Delaware Street; and,

WHEREAS, these Super Stops stations and bus-and-turn (BAT) lanes will require changes to parking, and new traffic management measures; now, therefore:

Should any provision (section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or any other portion) of this resolution be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, the remaining provision or provisions shall not be affected, if and only if such remaining provisions can, without the invalid provision or provisions, be given the effect intended by the Council in adopting this resolution. To this end the provisions of this resolution are severable.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

NEW BUSINESS

President Osili stated that one of the perfect attendance record recognitions for 2021 was overlooked at the last Council meeting. Councillor Lewis recognized Councillor Jackson for her perfect attendance for 2021. Councillor Jackson said that she does not think most people realize how hard it is to actually achieve perfect attendance, as most Councillors have full-time jobs, community meetings, meetings with staff and administration, as well as family and other social obligations. She said that she is proud of her attendance record and it is an honor to serve.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND ADJOURNMENT

The President said that the docketed agenda for this meeting of the Council having been completed, the Chair would entertain motions for adjournment.

Councillor Mowery stated that he had been asked to offer the following motion for adjournment by:

- (1) Councillor Jones in memory of Craig Olsen; and
- (2) Councillor Gray in memory of Forest Jones, Judge Webster Brewer, Lloyd Lyons, Todd Brian Hurt and Rev. Calvin Kelley; and
- (3) Councillors Mowery, Bain, Hart, Annee and Dilk in memory of Carl Brizzi.

Councillor Mowery moved the adjournment of this meeting of the Indianapolis City-County Council in recognition of and respect for the life and contributions of Craig Olsen, Forest Jones, Judge Webster Brewer, Lloyd Lyons, Todd Brian Hurt, Rev. Calvin Kelley, and Carl Brizzi. He respectfully asked the support of fellow Councillors. He further requested that the motion be made a part of the permanent records of this body and that a letter bearing the Council seal and the signature of the President be sent to the families advising of this action.

There being no further business, and upon motion duly made and seconded, the meeting adjourned at 8:03 p.m.
