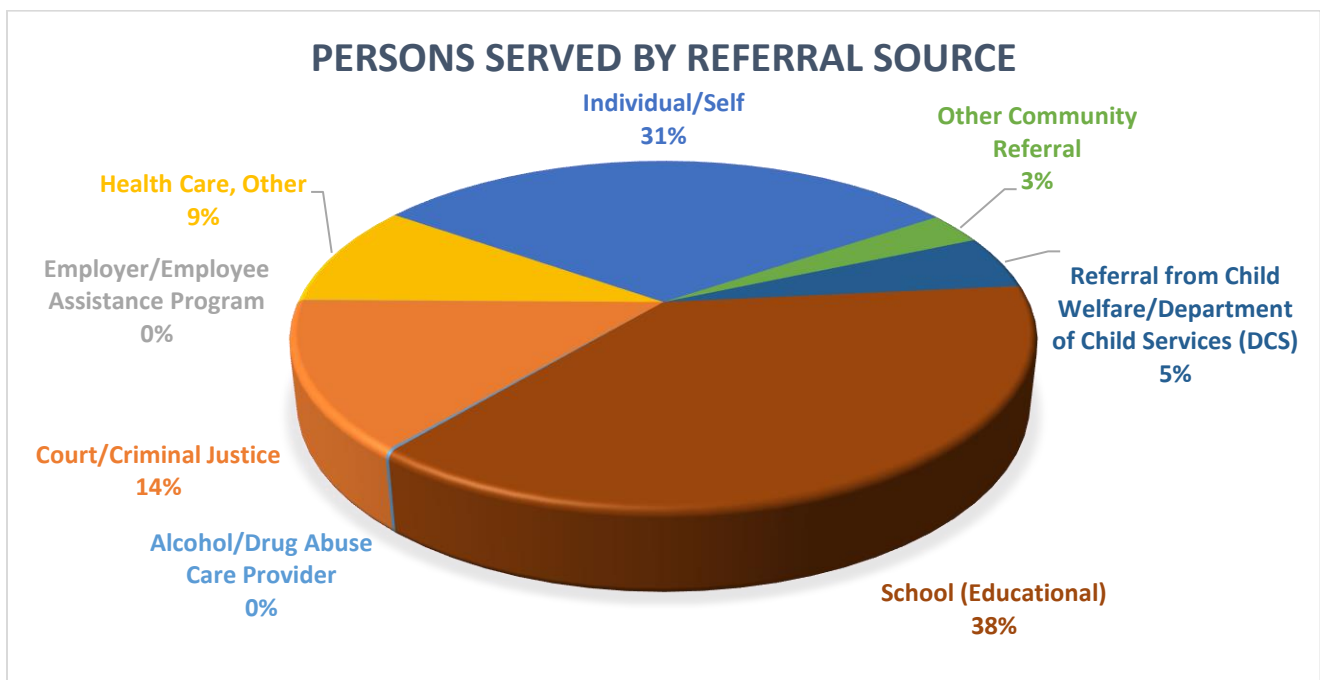

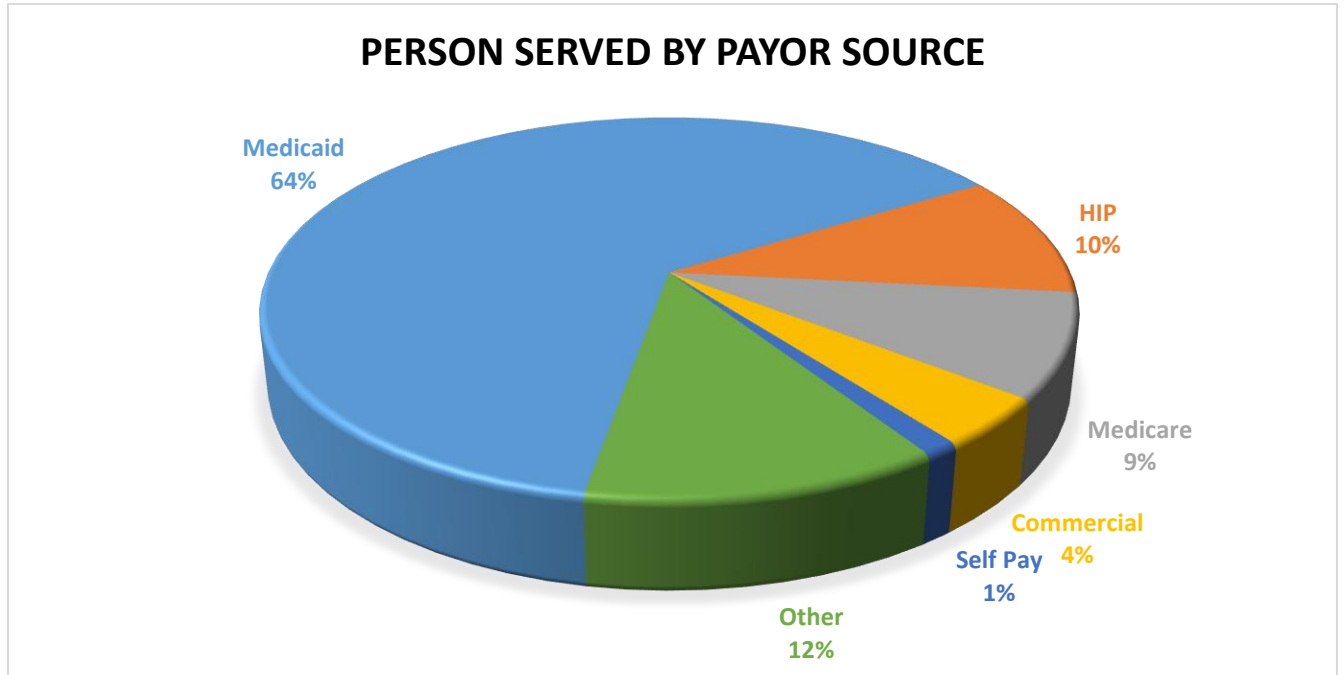

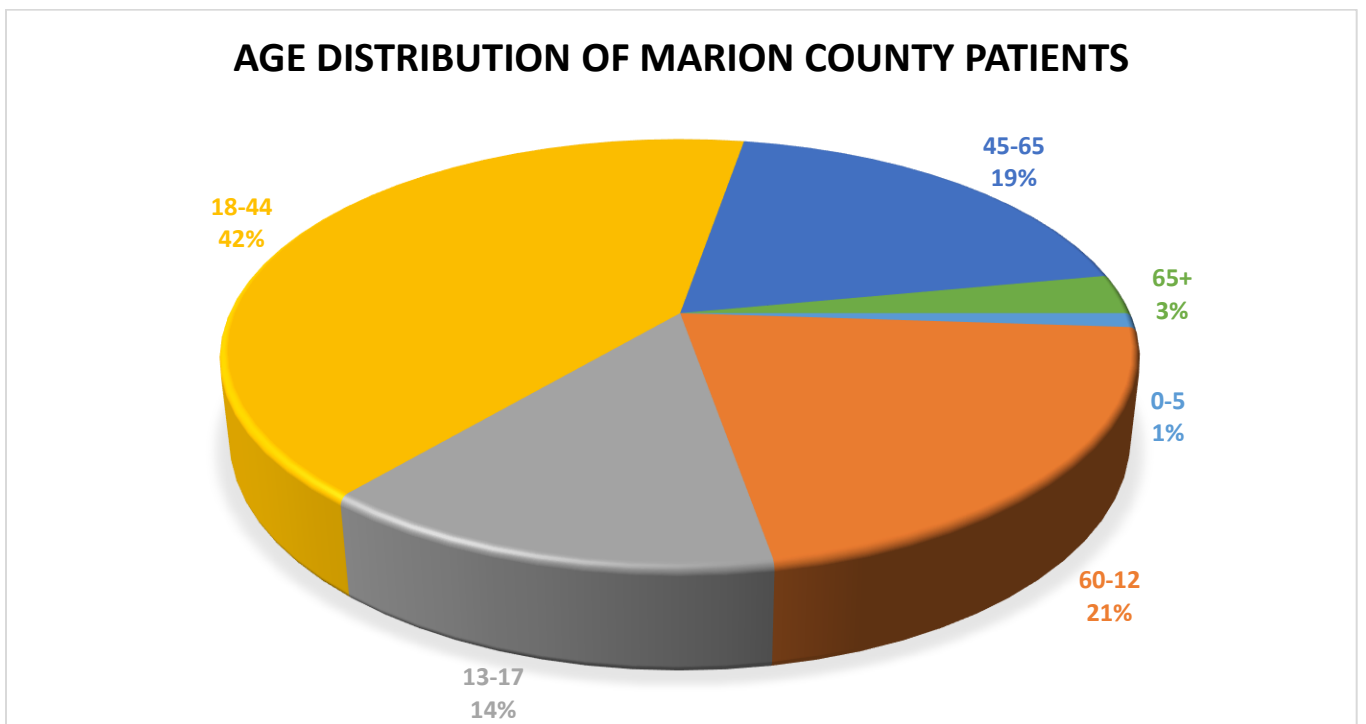

## Addiction Services

### Program Overview

Adult and Child Mental Health Center, Inc. is DMHA certified. Adult and Child offers outpatient addictions counseling services. Services are individualized with an expectation that care includes individual, group, and family therapy as well as medication services. Group sizes are typically between 6 and 15 clients unless it is for Education Classes. Services are provided at:

### Description of Services

Addictions services offered through Adult & Child Health Inc. are collaborative in nature. A&C utilizes the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria as a guideline to determine the level of treatment needs and assesses the use of MAT as a component of overall treatment.

Medication-assisted treatment (MAT) is the use of medications, in combination with behavioral therapies and interventions, to provide a “whole-patient” approach to the treatment of substance use disorders. Medications used in MAT are approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to treat substance use disorders as well as sustain recovery and prevent overdose. MAT treatment is based on evidence-based practices and tailored to the patient’s specific needs. Research shows that a combination of medication and therapy is the standard of care for individuals diagnosed with substance abuse and dependence. Medication alone is not effective in the treatment of substance abuse and dependence and therefore A&C’s guidelines include making sure a patient is able and willing to engage in therapeutic services prior to being placed on medication.

Clients referred from external parties should expect a collaborative treatment strategy to assist clients engage in recovery. Accordingly, collateral information is considered to formulate treatment recommendations and regular reports providing care progress updates (that include services received/missed, drug screen results, and general progress impressions) are standard operating procedure. Our goal is to be a treatment provider of choice for our referral sources. Our adult addictions program largely consists of Matrix and Living in Balance for more intensive programming followed up with Relapse Prevention for an aftercare strategy.

We offer an Integrated Dual Disorders Treatment (IDDT) program for our adults with severe mental illness struggling with a substance use disorder. We also offer a brief intensive group (BIG), which may use Prime for Life curriculum depending on when/where we have PFL certified therapists, that focuses on addictions-related education, psychological and social triggers for misuse, and harm reduction strategies for those with more abuse (non-dependence) level of impairment as well as a general drug and alcohol education class for individuals who have emerging drug/alcohol related use concerns but do not meet sufficient admission criteria for active treatment groups. A&C sends monthly progress reports to targeted referral sources.

- 4-Inpatient Detox partnerships
- 3-Matrix IOP 3 x weekly
- 2-Biweekly (Living in Balance) and likely Pain Program
- 1-Remission/Maintenance Groups/1:1 therapy
- 0-prn therapy and med management

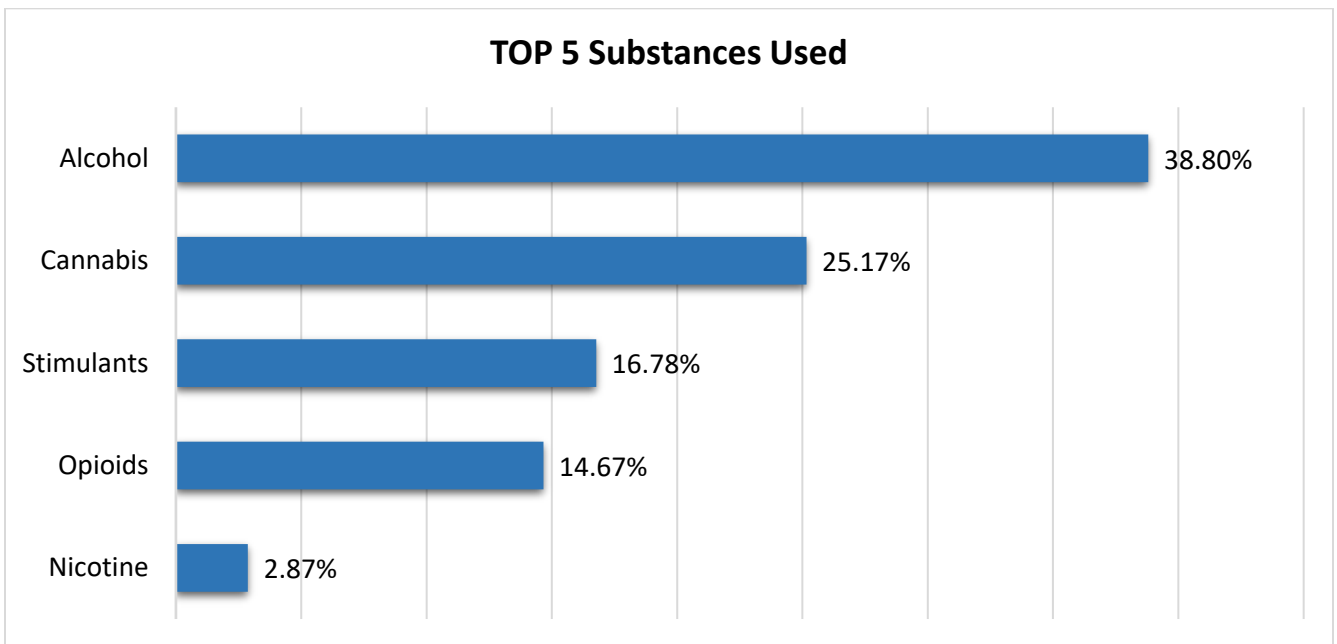

### Program Overview and Service Descriptions

A&C is an Indiana State Certified Community Mental Health Center, Licensed Child Placing Agency and Federally Qualified Health Center Look-a-like with a continuum of services. Adult & Child Health (A&C) strives to provide quality care, cost-effective health care while adhering to the highest ethical standards. A&C is committed to continuous improvement of healthcare treatment to create quality behavioral health, addictions, and primary care services, enhancing recovery and resilience for persons in need.

### Mobile Crisis Services

The mobile crisis team is designated through DMHA as a mobile responder to be dispatched for 988 calls and has a 24/7 hotline which community members can access at any point. Adult & Child has partnered with multiple organizations to build partnerships for referrals. We ensure that anyone that needs crisis support can

access our team through multiple avenues, to follow the no wrong door approach. Crisis services can be available to any person regardless of housing status and/or address. At the time of a crisis call, no matter how the call was referred to us, crisis staff triage for safety.

### **Crisis Stabilization Services**

A&C expanded its crisis continuum and now offers all three pillars of the continuum. Essential elements of integrated crisis system include Crisis Call Center, Crisis Mobile Response Team and Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Facilities. The three pillars of “someone to talk to, someone to respond and a place to go” are essential.

Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Services offer the community no-wrong-door access to mental health and substance use care, providing a therapeutic service and place to go in the third pillar of the crisis continuum. Mentally ill, Recovery/Addiction adults should have access to treatment for acute episodes of their illness in the most normal and least restrictive setting possible. Crisis services can be available to any person regardless of housing status and/or address.

A&C adheres to Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration’s (SAMHSA) National Guidelines for Behavioral Health Crisis Care Best Practice, offering crisis receiving and stabilization services to the community with no wrong door access to mental health and substance use care.

Our Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Services offer the community no-wrong-door access to mental health and substance use care, providing a therapeutic service and place to go in the third pillar of the crisis continuum. Mentally ill, Recovery/Addiction adults should have access to treatment for acute episodes of their illness in the most normal and least restrictive setting possible. Crisis services can be available to any person regardless of housing status and/or address.

### **Access Services**

The Access team uses a combination of open access model and scheduling for high-risk patients to allow for same day scheduling and quicker access to services. Open Access runs at two Marion County locations for A&C, downtown at 234 E Southern Avenue and at 8404 Seiar Terrace on the far south side. This team is staffed with licensed mental health professionals and conduct walk-in or scheduled intakes throughout the week. The team also houses Access Screeners providing scheduling and initial screening to callers regarding open access times and referral information. At times when the slots are full for the day, A&C will work to ensure the safety of the individual by asking critical triage/risk management questions and reminding them of the Open Access hours. Active clients experiencing emergencies speak directly with his/ her treatment team; if they are not available the Crisis stabilization team will assist. Non-active clients are connected to a member on the crisis stabilization team.

### **Outpatient Mental Health and Addictions**

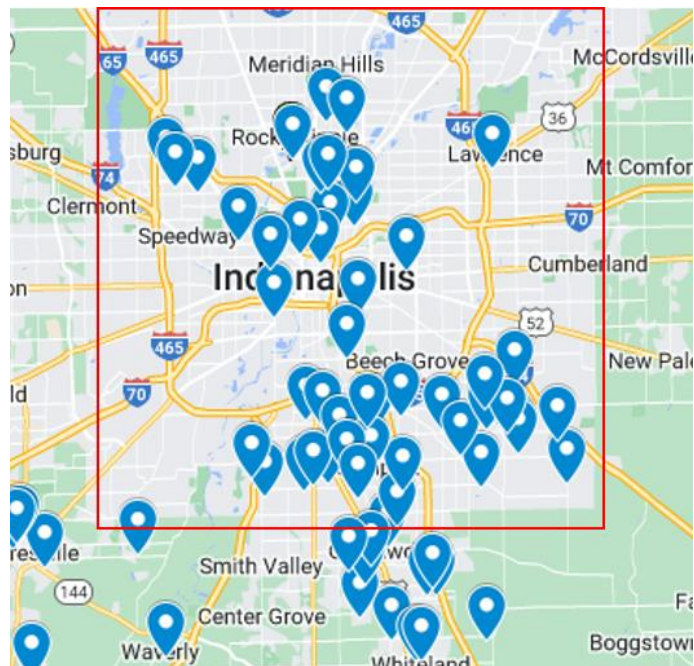
A&C specializes in treatment to individuals with mental health, addictions, and/or co-occurring disorders providing a strong rehabilitation team and partnership with Medical Director and medical staff to ensure

clinical excellence. Outpatient mental health and addictions teams are at the following Marion County locations: 8320 Madison Ave and 234 E Southern Avenue. Outpatient treatment often addresses a broad range of therapeutic needs from brief interventions to longer treatment models. Eligibility for this level of care is based on being capable of independence at a level not requiring intensive community-based, wrap around, and/or residential level case management services. A team of skills specialists, peer recovery specialists, and therapists provide a variety of therapeutic and case management services intending to maximize the client’s level of functioning. Services provided include assessment, individual therapy, family therapy, group therapy, activities of daily living, psychoeducation, and case management. Psychiatric evaluation may be available upon referral.

### School-Based Services

A&C provides best-in-class services to children and families in school-based and home settings. School teams provide services to children referred by their respective school systems. These schools refer students who

display academic, behavioral and/or interpersonal difficulties and need mental health support to thrive at their local community school. Staff encourage a team approach with the child, parents, natural supports, and school personnel to identify and address areas of need. These services can include assessment of level of functioning, individual and/or group therapy, consultation with teachers, parenting skill instruction, individual skill development, advocacy, community referrals, medication management, and coordination of services. The children/youth referred for school-based services receive an individualized approach to care which is delivered by the therapist, skill development specialist, and care coordinator for the team. Referrals are initially made to therapists who provide assessment, safety planning, individual therapy, skill development instruction, and consultation with the classroom teachers. Skill development specialists provide individual skill development, home-based services, including parenting education, advocacy, and coordination of services.

## **Community Based Treatment**

Community Based Treatment provides intensive services to adults with severe mental illness (SMI) in supportive independent living and community settings. Additionally, A&C provides services in the integrated health care clinic and works as a liaison to coordinate both primary care and behavioral health care in our primary care clinic. A&C has worked with this team to grow the Integrated Health Services Program by integrating behavioral and primary health care providing services to targeted high need adults, children, and families in outpatient and community settings. The team receives referrals primarily from DCS, juvenile court, high schools, primary care, internal team transfers, and via Access. The team sees that this population has special needs as they work towards individuation while balancing family support/involvement to assist in improving functioning and decreasing symptoms. The initial assessment is completed by a therapist who also provides safety planning, individual and group therapy, and skill development instruction. Skill development specialists provide individual skill development and home-based services, including independent living skills instruction, parenting education, advocacy, and coordination of services. Teams served under this division include ACT (Assertive Community Treatment), Team Madison, Zenith, FACT, and Adult State Operating Facility.

## **Assertive Community Treatment**

Adult and Child Health, in partnership with the City of Indianapolis and the IUPUI School of Psychology, are the recipients of a 5-year federal award from SAMHSA to develop and operate a high-fidelity Assertive Community Treatment Program service the high-risk homeless or housing insecure populations who also experience serious mental illness. This project was launched in April 2020 and in 2024 ACT served 116 clients Marion County clients. Supported employment is a focus of treatment for those enrolled in ACT services, focusing on building skills towards ongoing education or employment goals.

## **Homeless Outreach Services**

Supported in Marion County through multiple braided funding sources (PATH, HUD, and private foundations), A&C has active partnerships with Outreach Inc, Wheeler Mission, CHIP, Horizon House, Downtown Indy, INC and many others to outreach, support, and engage people who experience homelessness in services to support the patient's choice of a healthy lifestyle.

## **Supportive Services for Veterans**

In partnership with InteCare, provides outreach and support to veterans who experience homelessness, or are at risk of homelessness in Marion and surrounding counties.

## **Supported Housing Projects**

Core to A&C's vision for reducing the rate of homelessness and increasing housing stability among our population. Over the past year, A&C has expanded our partnerships to provide clinical and supportive services to more supported housing projects in Marion County than ever before. These partnerships include Hanna

Commons (Upholdings), Parker Place (Englewood Community Development Corporation), and Commonwealth (Englewood Community Development Corporation).

### **Circle City Clubhouse**

A&C partners with Circle City Clubhouse, located on the near northside in Marion County, in which we provide daily direct and indirect clinical support, psychosocial, to the members of their clubhouse model. This is another great example of A&C's willingness to partner with member focused agencies to support their behavioral health needs.

### **Youth Development Programming**

The Youth Development Programming (YDP) Empowers youth to thrive through holistic, strength-based, and community-centered care, fostering resilience, self-efficacy, and positive community engagement. YDP program is committed to creating a safe, inclusive, and supportive environment where young people can develop the skills, confidence, and connections needed to lead fulfilling lives and contribute to the well-being of their communities. This program provides a continuum of clinical services and grant funded programs to youth ages 10-23 years old, who are often at risk of mental illness, homelessness, lack of a support system, and other challenges related to social determinants of health. The program is comprised of multiple braided funding options and supports several hundred unique youth each year in Marion County, Johnson, and Morgan County.

Youth Community Based Clinical Services providing therapy and skills services to youth and families with mental health disorders. The program focuses on providing assessment, evidenced based interventions, skill-building, access to and coordination with community resources, education about mental health symptoms and treatment, and crisis prevention response.

*The DMHA TAY Grant* is one funding partners with Central Indiana Excel Centers to provide youth development group/individual programming that focuses on strengthening confidence, knowledge, resources, and abilities so youth are effective advocates for their own health.

*Safe Place Coordinator* Marion, Morgan, and Johnson County is a national outreach prevention program for youth in crisis under the age of 18 years old. Adult and Child is the Safe Place Coordinator for Marion, Morgan, and Johnson County and has partnered with over 300 local business and organizations youth immediate safety and access to supportive resources.

### **Wraparound**

Wraparound programming involves comprehensive, individualized approach designed to meet the diverse needs of children and families, especially those facing significant challenges. These services involve intensive, custom-designed care planning and case management process with a focus on youth and family choice and voice. Key components of wraparound services include individualized care, strength-based approach, community-based services, and a team-driven approach.

## **Residential**

A&C has also partnered with Valle Vista Residential Treatment Center (RTC) to provide intensive clinical services on their RTC unit for females ages 12-18. A&C provides intake and assessment, skills and skills groups, individual therapy and group therapy, and is the aftercare service provider contracted with Valle Vista to follow clients who have discharged up to 6 months post-discharge.

## **Gatekeeper Services for State Operating Facilities**

On behalf of DMHA, A&C also provides admission coordination or gatekeeping services to the public for placement into the State's Mental Health Hospitals. These State Operating Facilities (SOF) are considered the highest level of intense care in the State of Indiana and recommendations for placement are only made after a thorough review of the record and implementation of intensive community services have been attempted. A Service Line Director (or designee) acts as the gatekeeper for A&C and is responsible for working with clients, families, and direct staff in the completion of the DMHA Hospital Referral Form. This referral form is a process in which A&C reviews the client's record, assesses for current functioning through interviews and the CANS/ANSA instrument, and offers the client/family intensive community wraparound support if these services have not already been attempted. The Gatekeeper will make a determination of the client's appropriateness for placement in the SOF and submit a recommendation to the SOF's admissions committee for final approval. If the client is admitted to an SOF, the Gatekeeper will monitor the client's progress throughout their length of stay in the facility and complete the Gatekeeper SOF Client Summary Form to document this progress. Finally, the Gatekeeper will be part of the discharge and aftercare planning with the family and SOF to ensure smooth transition back into the client's natural community.

## **Child Welfare Services**

A&C provides a variety of clinical and non-clinical services to children, adults and families involved in the child welfare or juvenile justice system. A&C is also a Licensed Child Placing Agency (LCPA) that licenses, trains and maintains over 50 foster homes across Central Indiana available for child placement as referred by the Department of Child Services or juvenile probation. The Child Welfare Service Line accepts referrals to provide clinical and child welfare services to meet the needs of the family involved in the child welfare system. A&C has the ability to provide services to improve child safety and family stability as well as address an underlying mental health or addictions issues that commonly lead to child welfare concerns. A&C further works with service partners and families to appropriately ready and prepare for family reunification when an out-of-home placement has occurred. Teams served under this service line include Foster Care Licensing, Therapeutic Foster Care, and Home-Based Programs.

## **Other Programs**

A&C includes a team of licensed clinical psychologists who lead and support care oversight, supervision, and staffing activities for all clinical programs. A&C also has a Medical Services Team comprised of Board-Certified Psychiatrists, Advanced Practice Nurses, nurses, and medical assistants. This medical services team functions in a cross-system format to work with all of A&C teams to deliver appropriate and effective pharmacotherapy.

The psychiatrists, APNs', and HSPPs collaborate in clinical staffing to ensure that client care is effective, seamless, and that communication is consistent.

### **Commitment to Evidence Based Practices**

### **Positive Mental Health Promotion and Suicide Awareness Activities**

A&C maintains a centralized toll-free telephone number (877.882.5122) to assure that all clients have access to its services and can receive inquiries via fax or the Relay Indiana Service for the deaf and hard of hearing. The Call Center manages all incoming calls for the A&C allowing for efficient and accurate continuity of care, scheduling, and triage of client needs. Additionally, A&C maintains a 24-hour, seven-day-a-week emergency services team, along with a contracted 24-hour face-to-face clinical assessment capacity.

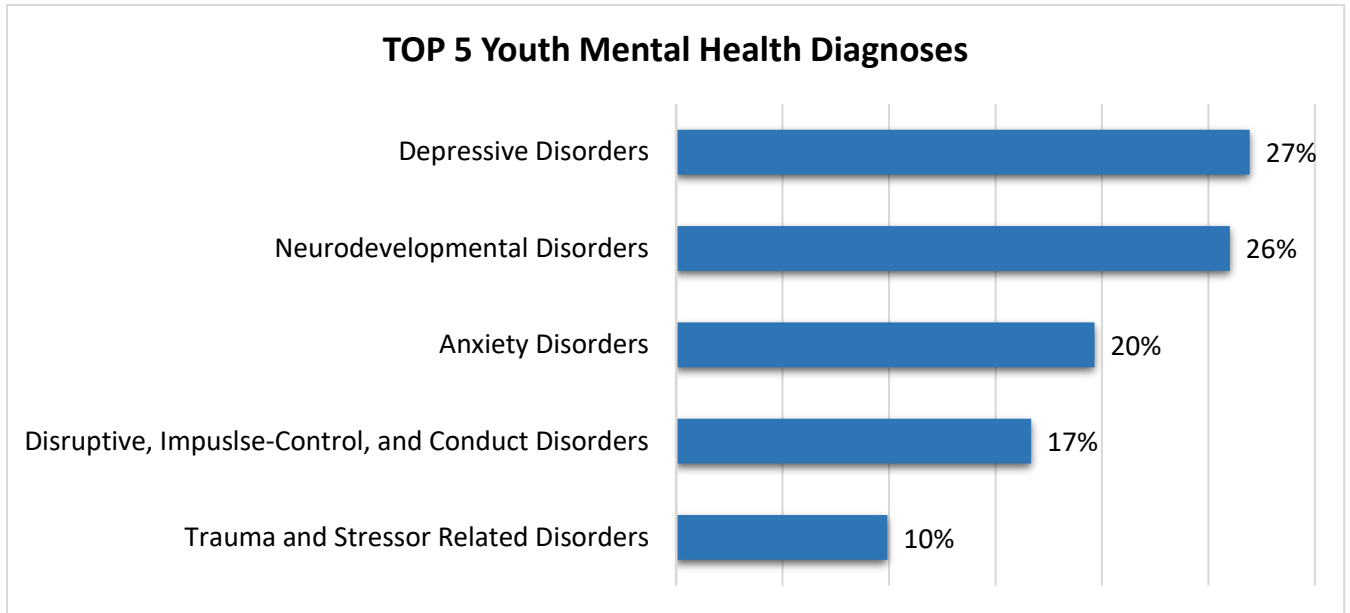
A&C provides Mental Health First Aid training to community partners or participants, providing both adult and youth focus.
