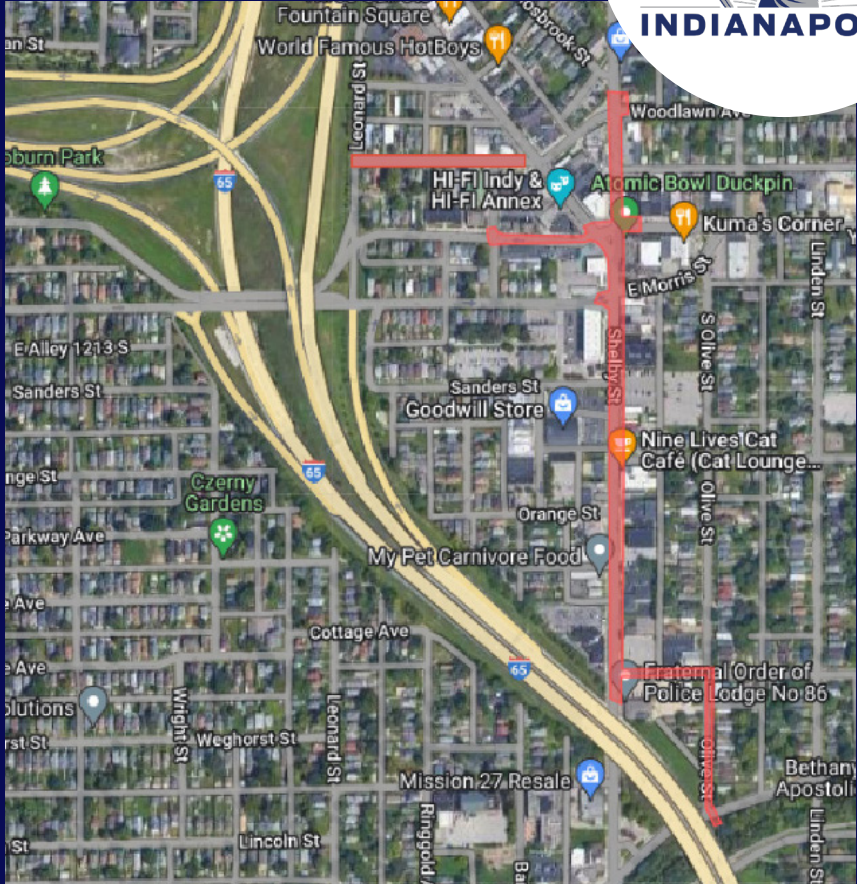


FOUNTAIN SQUARE AREA DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT



PROJECT DETAILS

The Fountain Square Area Drainage Improvements Project will help relieve flooding, primarily along Shelby Street from Woodlawn Avenue to the north and along Cottage Avenue and Olive Street to the south. Surrounding streets in the Fountain Square neighborhood will also benefit from the construction of the new separate storm system, from both the initial and planned future phases of the project.

ANTICIPATED CONSTRUCTION:
Quarter 1, 2026 to Quarter 2, 2027
EST. CONSTRUCTION COST: \$14 Million
NEIGHBORHOODS: Fountain Square

Stormwater on Shelby Street will drain to the bioretention system (aka: rain garden), improving water quality and quantity management in the area. The rain garden feature will also improve safety along the cycle track in this area.

One block of Woodlawn Avenue will also be repaved between Virginia Avenue and Leonard Street.

The Indianapolis Department of Public Works (DPW) and its construction team is committed to keeping the public informed, and addressing any questions or concerns, prior to and during construction.
