

**MINUTES OF THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL
AND
SPECIAL SERVICE DISTRICT COUNCILS
OF
INDIANAPOLIS, MARION COUNTY, INDIANA
MONDAY, APRIL 12, 2021**

The City-County Council of Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana and the Indianapolis Police Special Service District Council, Indianapolis Fire Special Service District Council and Indianapolis Solid Waste Collection Special Service District Council convened in regular concurrent sessions, with the majority of members attending electronically via WebEx, in the Council Chamber of the City-County Building at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, April 12, 2021 with Councillor Osili presiding from the Chamber.

Councillor Bain introduced Pastor Neil Mack, Camby Tabernacle, who led the opening prayer. Councillor Bain then invited all present to join him in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

FISCAL ORDINANCE NO. 6, 2021 – approves an additional appropriation of \$19,000,000 in the 2021 City Non-Departmental Budget (Consolidated County General Fund) to begin the work of design and site due diligence for projects later funded with bond proceeds

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 7, 2021 – authorizes intersection controls and one way designation on 14th Street at Belmont Avenue and White River Parkway West Drive (District 11)

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 8, 2021 – authorizes intersection controls at Arborcrest Drive and Esquire Place (District 13)

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 9, 2021 – authorizes intersection controls at Manker Street and Southview Drive (District 23)

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 10, 2021 – adds a new Chapter 812 to temporarily limit charges and fees during the COVID-19 pandemic

SPECIAL ORDINANCE NO. 2, 2021 – re-establishes the County Cumulative Capital Development Fund for Marion County pursuant to IC 36-9-14.5

GENERAL RESOLUTION NO. 2, 2021 – determines the need to lease approximately 40,750 square feet of space located at 3737 E. Washington Street for use by the Marion County Election Board

GENERAL RESOLUTION NO. 3, 2021 – approves the amounts, locations, and programmatic operation of certain projects to be funded from the Community Development Grant Funds

SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 18, 2021 – recognizes Donald Davidson upon his retirement as a historian for the Indianapolis Motor Speedway

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

The President proposed the adoption of the agenda as distributed. Without objection, the agenda was adopted.

APPROVAL OF THE JOURNAL

The President called for additions or corrections to the Journals of March 15, 2021. There being no further additions or corrections, the minutes were approved as amended.

PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, MEMORIALS, SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS, AND COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS

PROPOSAL NO. 136, 2021. The proposal, sponsored by Councillor Annee, recognizes the 125th Anniversary of Lauck and Veldhof Funeral and Cremation Services. Councillors Jones and Annee read the proposal Councillor Annee moved, seconded by Councillor Jones, for adoption. Proposal No. 136, 2021 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 136, 2021 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 19, 2021, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 19, 2021

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION recognizing the 125th anniversary of Lauck & Veldhof Funeral & Cremation Services.

WHEREAS, Lauck & Veldhof Funeral & Cremation Services has been serving the southside, downtown and greater Indianapolis community since its inception in 1896 by Anthony J. Lauck; and

WHEREAS, the first location was established on S. Meridian Street where I-70 currently crosses and was moved to its present location in the early 1920s by Anthony P. Lauck, A.J.'s son; and

WHEREAS, Lauck & Veldhof Funeral and Cremation Services' current location was originally part of a large farm stretching back to West Street and the railroad tracks. The original part of the house was built in 1877 and had additions added in 1954 and 1960; and

WHEREAS, new additions were added by Leo Lauck, Sr., who was quite active in the funeral business and community until his passing in 1972. The chapel he added in 1960 was one of the largest at that time and will seat 130 people. His son, Leo, Jr., then took over the family business in the early 1970s and continues to help, even though the business was sold to Jeff Veldhof in 2010. Jeff Veldhof completely remodeled the facility inside and out and brought everything up to date; and

WHEREAS, Lauck & Veldhof believes in being an active part of our community, as Jeff Veldof is a member of both St. Roch and Sacred Heart Churches; and he serves on the parish council at St. Roch and on the board of the Old Southside Neighborhood Association, as a member of the Stadium Village Business Association, and as a block captain with Keep Indianapolis Beautiful; and

WHEREAS, providing comfort for neighborhood families in their time of need is the main concern of the staff at Lauck & Veldhof. They are a small family-owned firm and take great pride in the personal services they offer; now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The Indianapolis City-County Council proudly recognizes Lauck and Veldhof Funeral and Cremation Services on their 125th Anniversary.

SECTION 2. The Council extends best wishes for continued success to Lauck & Veldhof Funeral & Cremation Services.

SECTION 3. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 4. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

PROPOSAL NO. 141, 2021. The proposal, sponsored by Councillors Osili and Jones, recognizes the service and leadership of IU President Michael A. McRobbie upon his retirement. Councillors Jones and Osili read the proposal and recognized Mr. McRobbie. Councillors E. Evans and McCormick asked to be added as co-sponsors. Mr. McRobbie thanked the Council for the recognition. Councillor Jones moved, seconded by Councillor McCormick, for adoption. Proposal No. 141, 2021 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 141, 2021 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 20, 2021, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 20, 2021

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION recognizing the service and leadership of IU President Michael A. McRobbie upon his retirement.

WHEREAS, Michael A. McRobbie became the 18th president of Indiana University on July 1, 2007 and has, for the past 14 years, been responsible for eight campuses, more than 9,000 faculty, 11,000 staff, yearly enrollment of nearly 115,000 undergraduate and graduate students, and an annual budget totaling more than \$3 billion; and

WHEREAS, President McRobbie has led one of the largest academic transformations in Indiana University history, one that includes the creation of the Richard M. Fairbanks School of Public Health in Indianapolis; the School of Public Health-Bloomington; the Lilly Family School of Philanthropy at IUPUI, the world's first school of its kind; and

WHEREAS, during his tenure, President McRobbie redoubled Indiana University's commitment to student success, faculty development, research, economic development, international engagement, and the health of Indiana residents; and

WHEREAS, in 2012, President McRobbie became the first sitting IU president to be elected a member of the American Academy of Arts and is a member and former chair of the Board of Trustees of Internet2, is a member of the Boards of Indiana University Health and of Riley Children's Hospital, is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and is the former chair of the Universities Research Association, which is responsible for Fermi Lab; and

WHEREAS, President McRobbie has had substantial involvement in the development of the life and health sciences in Indiana and under his leadership, IUPUI has become the largest educator of the health and life science workforce in the state; and

WHEREAS, during his tenure, IUPUI has bestowed 69,748 Associate's, Bachelor's, Master's and Doctoral degrees from Indiana University and 16,999 from Purdue University; and

WHEREAS, 64.5% of these graduates live in Indianapolis and were prepared by the university for careers in health and life sciences, social work, technology, teaching, engineering, law, public policy, business, the arts, and more; and

WHEREAS, the IUPUI campus has an economic impact of \$2.3 billion on the central Indiana region and 1 out of every 42 jobs in the IUPUI service area are supported by IUPUI; and

WHEREAS, President McRobbie's broad expertise in fostering research partnerships and his collaborative leadership style have contributed greatly to the provision by Indiana University and IUPUI of vast resources of data and expertise - such as the POLIS Center, SAVI database, the Indiana Business Research Center, the IU Public Policy Institute, and the Center for Research on Inclusion & Social Policy - which are used by businesses, nonprofits and federal, state, and local units of government, including this Council, to support informed and equitable decision-making; now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The Indianapolis City County Council proudly recognizes the service and accomplishments of Michael A. McRobbie during his 14 years as president of Indiana University.

SECTION 2. The Council heartily congratulates President McRobbie on his retirement from Indiana University and looks forward to his continuing contributions as an author and civic leader.

SECTION 3. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 4. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

PROPOSAL NO. 142, 2021. The proposal, sponsored by Councillors McCormick and Potts, condemns all forms of racist harassment, violence, or bias against the Asian American and Pacific

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Islander community. Councillors McCormick and Potts read the proposal and recognized Katherin Chi, National Asian Pacific American Women’s Forum, who thanked the Council for the recognition. Councillors E. Evans, Barth, Boots, and Jones asked to be added as co-sponsors. Councillor Potts moved, seconded by Councillor McCormick, for adoption. Proposal No. 142, 2021 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 142, 2021 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 21, 2021, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 21, 2021

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION condemning all forms of racist harassment, violence, or bias against the Asian American and Pacific Islander community.

WHEREAS, all communities of color, including Black and Brown people, indigenous people, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, and generally all racial, ethnic, socio-economic and social minorities, are at risk of discrimination; and

WHEREAS, all forms of racism and ethnocentrism constitute a major threat to equity, diversity, inclusivity and social justice in the lives of black and brown people, indigenous people, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, and generally all racial, ethnic, socio-economic and social minorities, in terms of education, justice, environment, employment and economy, income, housing, health and health care, and safety; and

WHEREAS, on February 20th of 2020, the members of this Council unanimously adopted a proposal declaring racism to be unjust, reiterating our support for equal rights for all and affirming the City's commitment to ending disparities based on race, place, or identity; and

WHEREAS, racism and ethnocentrism have a negative impact on the wellbeing of individuals, families, and the entire Indianapolis community; and

WHEREAS, 29,429 Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders who represent 3.4% of Marion County’s total population today call Indianapolis home; and

WHEREAS, March 11, 2021 marked the one-year anniversary of the declaration of COVID-19 as a global pandemic and the beginning of a surge in anti-Asian harassment and violence nationwide; and

WHEREAS, over 2 million Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders are working on the frontlines of this COVID–19 pandemic in health care, law enforcement, first responders, transportation, supermarkets, and other service industries; and

WHEREAS, a PerryUdem November 2020 survey, found that 1 in 6 Asian American and Pacific Islander voters say they or a family member have faced racism related to COVID-19, with the targets of these incidents often being elders, women, or low-income people; and

WHEREAS, the Stop AAPI Hate Reporting Center received information on 3,795 incidents of racism directed at Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the United States between March 19, 2020 to February 28, 2021, including reports of verbal harassment, physical assault, civil rights violations, and online harassment occurring in all 50 States and the District of Columbia; and

WHEREAS, the Indiana Chapter of the National Asian Pacific American Women’s Forum reports that “One of the most devastating effects of the pandemic has been the dramatic spike in discrimination, bigotry, and violence towards AAPI Hoosiers” and that across Indiana, children have been bullied at school, and families going outdoors and employees going to work have faced hostility, verbal abuse, and violence”; and

WHEREAS, 46 Indiana organizations and institutions based in the state have joined a call for action from the Indiana Chapter of the National Asian Pacific American Women’s Forum, including Indiana University, the City of Bloomington, Butler University, Indiana American Chinese Association, Indiana American Chinese Association, Korean American Association of Indiana, Faith in Indiana, Greater Indianapolis Multifaith Alliance, Indiana Muslim Advocacy Network, Indianapolis Jewish Community Relations Council, Marion County Commission on Youth, Immigration Justice Task Force, Women4Change, and Indiana National Organization for Women; and

WHEREAS, this Council has previously and repeatedly repudiated racism and ethnocentrism while articulating its support for the dignity of all persons and its commitment to dismantling inequities based on race, place, and identity; now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The Indianapolis City-County Council condemns and denounces any and all forms of anti-Asian or Pacific Islander sentiment, including online and verbal harassment, vandalization of business or personal property, and physical attacks.

SECTION 2. The Council similarly condemns all manifestations of expressions of racism, xenophobia, discrimination, scapegoating, and ethnic or religious intolerance.

SECTION 3. The Council supports local law enforcement officials in their efforts to expeditiously investigate and document all reports of crimes and threats against the AAPI community in our city and to obtain justice for both victims and perpetrators.

SECTION 4. The Council urges all City and County agencies and elected officials to combat misinformation and discrimination that puts the AAPI community at risk.

SECTION 5. The Council encourages City and County agencies and community partners to implement procedures and programs to help Asian American and Pacific Islander persons, families, faith communities, businesses, and institutions if they are targeted by acts of discrimination and hate.

SECTION 6. The Council affirms its ongoing commitment to building a more inclusive, diverse, tolerant, and equitable city for the benefit of all its residents.

SECTION 7. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 8. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

PROPOSAL NO. 143, 2021. The proposal, sponsored by Councillors J. Evans, Osili and Jones, honors all those who contributed to the City of Indianapolis hosting a safe, successful NCAA men's basketball tournament. Councillors J. Evans and Jones read the proposal and recognized Ryan Vaughn, Indianapolis Sports Corporation; Joanne Sanders, International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees; Aaron Winegard, Local Stagehands Union; and Jeremy Kranowitz, Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, who thanked the Council for the recognition. Councillors Annee, Barth, Graves, Potts, McCormick, Oliver and Hart asked to be added as co-sponsors. Councillor J. Evans moved, seconded by Councillor Jones, for adoption. Proposal No. 143, 2021 was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Proposal No. 143, 2021 was retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 22, 2021, and reads as follows:

CITY-COUNTY SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 22, 2021

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION honoring all those who contributed to the City of Indianapolis hosting a safe, successful NCAA men's basketball tournament.

WHEREAS, between March 18 and April 5, 2021, the City of Indianapolis hosted the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, hosting 68 college basketball teams, including players, coaches, and staff, and more than 115,000 visiting fans; and

WHEREAS, a coalition of Indianapolis organizations, including the Capital Improvement Board and Indiana Convention Center, Downtown Indy Inc., Visit Indy, Indiana Sports Corporation, Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, Pacers Sports & Entertainment, the Indianapolis Colts, Lilly Endowment, the Indianapolis Cultural Trail, the Arts Council of Indianapolis, Butler University, GANGGANG, AES Indiana, Heritage Interactive Services, the IUPUI Office of Sustainability, the Indiana State Fair, Indiana University Health, and thousands of Indianapolis community volunteers, joined forces to show our city at its "Hoosier Hospitality" best, providing a once-in-a-lifetime experience to players,

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parents, officials, and fans and one of the most climate-friendly, environmentally sustainable March Madness tournaments ever; and

WHEREAS, the hard work of those organizations was combined with the diligent efforts of Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb, Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, the Indianapolis Fire Department, Indianapolis EMS, the Indianapolis Department of Public Works, Indy Parks, and the Marion County Health Department to ensure the health and safety of our visitors, our residents, and our workforce throughout the tournament; and

WHEREAS, Indianapolis community volunteers with Downtown Indy Inc. hosted community clean-ups to welcome fans to a spotless Mile Square before and during the tournament, while volunteers with Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, including Butler Blue IV, picked up litter along 12 miles of city streets along the routes teams traveled, and planted 68 trees in Andrew Ramsey Park and Elwood-Mary Black Park, one for every team in the tournament; and

WHEREAS, despite these laudable contributions, the true MVPs of the 2021 NCAA Tournament are the workers of Indianapolis, who safely housed hundreds of players and staff from 68 teams in 4 hotels, some for almost a month; carefully moved players and staff between 4 game venues, prepared and individually wrapped thousands of meals from more than 88 local restaurants to be delivered to teams almost around the clock; provided the behind-the-scenes crews managing the sound, lighting, and overall production in all the venues; and cared for fans at Hinkle Fieldhouse, Lucas Oil Stadium, Bankers Life Fieldhouse, and Indiana Farmers Coliseum; and

WHEREAS, it is thanks to these workers that, out of more than 28,000 COVID-19 tests conducted over the course of the NCAA Men’s Basketball Tournament, only 15 individuals tested positive for COVID-19, a case-positivity rate of only one-twentieth of one percent, with only 1 team eliminated from the tournament due to the virus and 66 out of 67 scheduled games proceeding as planned; and

WHEREAS, it was the commitment and spirit of our city’s workers that inspired national media outlet Sports Illustrated to declare of Indianapolis, “this city is lighting the path of hope and optimism” as our nation “emerges slowly from its COVID-19 cave”; now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY-COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The Indianapolis City-Council offers its deepest thanks to the persons and organizations listed above, with special recognition for the dedication of the Indianapolis workforce, as our community rebounds from the COVID-19 pandemic.

SECTION 2. This Council congratulates all those who took part in the planning and execution of an overwhelmingly successful, safe, and sustainable NCAA Men’s Basketball Tournament.

SECTION 3. The Mayor is invited to join in this resolution by affixing his signature hereto.

SECTION 4. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 36-3-4-14.

Councillor Hart asked if this expense will be reimbursed by federal dollars. Matt Giffin, interim director of the Office of Public Health and Safety (OPHS), said that \$2.4 million is 100% reimbursable by FEMA, and moving it to this fund allows them to extend this program for three months without additional cost to the city.

Councillor Gray asked where it this is located and what kind of mediation is performed. Julie Fidler, director, said that this is community mediation, not mediation by a lawyer, and they try to help neighbors having conflicts from becoming a situation that escalates to violence. This is guided by volunteers and an advisory board made up of community members. It is located at E. 10th Street and Rural Street, across from the Marathon Gas Station.

Councillor Annee said that this is a great way to acknowledge James Waters and is a great tribute to him and all his efforts to reduce violent crime in the city.

Councillors Adamson and Jackson echoed Councillor Annee’s comments and said that he was an enormous loss to this city and community.
