Cameron Banks and Desmond Banks sentenced to 220 years for 2020 quadruple homicide *Braxton Ford, Kimari Hunt, Jalen Roberts, and Marcel Wills were shot and killed in February 2020*

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. – Marion County Prosecutor Ryan Mears announced that Cameron and Desmond Banks have been sentenced to prison for their roles in the February 2020 shooting deaths of Braxton Ford, Kimari Hunt, Jalen Roberts, and Marcel Wills. Today, Cameron and Desmond Banks were sentenced to 220 years in the Indiana Department of Correction.

During today's hearing, Lasean Watkins was appointed new counsel and his hearing was reset for April 28.

Cameron Banks, Desmond Banks, and Watkins were convicted of multiple charges after a five-day jury trial that concluded in March. All three defendants were convicted of four counts of Murder, four counts of Felony Murder, and four counts of Robbery Resulting in Serious Bodily Injury (Level 2 Felonies).

"This case serves as a tragic reminder of the lasting effects of gun violence," Prosecutor Mears stated. "The Prosecutor's Office will continue to pursue justice for families like Braxton's, Kimari's, Jalen's, and Marcel's that have experienced such senseless loss. As a community, it is on us to continue supporting these families and keep the memories of their loved ones alive."

In Oct. 2022, a fourth suspect, Rodrice Anderson, pleaded guilty to four counts of Robbery Resulting in Serious Bodily Injury (Level 2 Felonies). Pursuant to the agreement, Anderson agreed to cooperate with the prosecution. A sentencing hearing for Anderson is scheduled for Monday, April 3 at 1 p.m.

On Feb. 5, 2020, IMPD officers responded to a residence in the 4100 block of Shady Oak Drive where they discovered the bodies of Ford, Hunt, Roberts, and Wills. All four victims had suffered multiple gunshot wounds. The inside of the apartment appeared to be ransacked with evidence of a safe that was opened and emptied.

Three suspects could be seen on surveillance footage entering the residence and fleeing to a vehicle shortly after the shooting occurred. Utilizing that footage, investigators were able to identify the suspects' vehicle as belonging to Anderson. In an interview with detectives, Anderson initially denied any involvement in this crime before admitting that he drove the suspects to the scene of the crime after the four had planned a robbery.
